I outline the main points of my objection.

- Huge house building schemes much of it on Green Belt land and much of it in South Warrington beautiful villages surrounded by equally beautiful Green Belt land.
- WBC claims that they are following guidelines set by the Government on the amount of new hou built. Apparently, the figures are set by using the 2014 population growth data. It appears from the population grown between 2019 and 2039 will be 21k. So at 2.3 persons per home, that equates the 9k. So why have WBC deemed a house build of a much higher figure? Is it more to do with the with wanting to make Warrington a city? A completely ridiculous aspiration. The Councillors make a city but as the recent petition showed, there is no appetite for it amongst the electorate. The stated that the Green Belt should only be used in exceptional circumstances. Building more house not an exceptional circumstance!
- Overwhelming construction of commercial premises in Appleton Thorn and Grappenhall, again land.
- Massive increase in traffic that the building of new houses and commercial premises will genera

Schools and doctors' surgeries are over-subscribed, our hospital has real shortage of beds.
